Family Day





A Healthy Welder

When a welder strikes an arc, fumes, gases and high-intensity ultra-violet light are given off. These hazards can cause ill-health effects to the worker. Though these hazards are a fact of life for a welder, they can be minimized through employee training, protective equipment and engineering controls, such as proper ventilation and opaque welding shields.

All welding processes produce fumes whose chemical composition is determined by the base metal, the electrode, and any preservative coating on the metal itself. Toxic gases, such as carbon monoxide, nitrogen dioxide, ozone and phosgene, may be formed in the welding process.

High intensity ultra-violet (UV) light, emitted by welding arcs, produce gaseous air contaminants and skin burns. "Welder's flash", caused by looking at an arc without appropriate eye protection, can occur.


Welders tend to work in confined spaces, periodically, which can create a problem of retaining fumes and poor ventilation. Also, some welding work may produce atmospheres that are either oxygen-deficient or oxygen enriched. An oxygen-deficient environment causes acute exposure to toxic fumes and gases to the workers, causing illness, and sometimes death. An oxygen-enriched environment in confined spaces can cause sparks to ignite and cause unexpected fires.

Protection — welders should be informed of the nature of the hazards to which they may be exposed. This is a mandatory OSHA's Hazard Communication Standard.

All welders must use protective equipment, such as face shields, protective clothing, and gloves.

Examine your present ventilation system. A local exhaust system is needed to capture air contaminants at the source

Findings of a Recent Substance Abuse Study

FINDING: Military people are significantly less likely than civilians to abuse any type of drug. According to the study, only 8.4% of service members age 18 to 55 reported using drugs within the past month as compared with 24.1% of civilians in the same age group.

FINDING: Women service members are significantly more likely than their civilian counterparts to smoke one or more packs of cigarettes per day. Male service members are more likely to use smokeless or chewing tobacco.

FINDING: Military personnel under the age of 26 are significantly more likely to drink and drink heavily, when compared with their civilian age group.

FINDING: Military personnel are more likely than civilians to have negative experiences associated with alcohol. These negative experiences include staying drunk for more that one day at a time, being drunk on the job or missing work because of a hangover. More than half (56%) of service members included in the study reported having negative experiences with alcohol while only 41% of civilians report having this type of experience.

WHAT DOES IT ALL MEAN? The "Military/ Civilian Comparison of Alcohol, Drug and Tobacco Use" Report, commissioned by the Department of Defense, concluded that these findings suggest that military conditions may foster alcohol abuse. To further substantiate this conclusion, they state that nearly one third (30%) of service members feel that "drinking is part of being in the military." An even larger percentage (35%) say that they feel that drinking is encouraged at parties and/or social functions.

Based upon these findings, the Department of Defense believes it will have to intensify its efforts to combat alcohol abuse. For members in the HIANG, we must be aware that some of the conditions which support alcohol abuse by military members is also present in our civilian jobs. Based upon the DOD study, about 2 of every 3 civilian workers have been drunk on the job and/or missed work because they had a hangover. Using alcohol in moderation and at the proper times is the key. Want to know more about substance abuse and/or how to effectively deal with others? Contact Social Actions at 449-8000.

DEERS PRE-ENROLLMENT: Even though the initial pre-enrollment is over, the program is not. Members must continue to update changes in dependent information and we must continue to pre-enroll new members.

AIRCREW STYLE NAME PATCH (ASNP): The issue of wearing "ANG" instead of "USAF" on the second line of the ASNP on the BDUs was disapproved by HQ USAF. IAW IMC 92-1, 1516507. April 1992, members are authorized to wear the new ASNP. The ASNP is an optional wear and must be purchased by the member. Issuance will begin on or after the mandatory wear date of October 1, 1995. Those of you authorized to wear badges, may only wear one the "most current" in relation to your current as-

signed duties:

OFFICIAL PHOTOGRAPHS: Attention all officers, ANGRC recently changed the notification policy for those of you who need an official photo. Upon receipt of the official photo RIP, Records Section will insure the reason is correct and forward the original to your home address via certified mail, return receipt requested. A copy of the RIP will be forwarded to your commander and one copy will be filed in your records. We are no longer required to send follow-up letters for no shows. Remember, it is your responsibility to insure there is an up-to-date photo in your selection folder.

FIELD JACKET: The olive green field jacket wearout date has been changed from September 30, 1992 to a wearout date through attrition. Field jackets are "non-returnable" which means members are not

required to turn them in.

Excellence Award for 1992.

I'm not trying to make any excuses for our delays, however, our heavy day-to-day workload can become almost unbearable at times when those last minute quotas come in, or special projects, or special requests, etc., are dropped in our laps. A month, when you're not here every day, may seem like a long time; but for those of us who keep things going between drills, it's not long enough. Believe me, we're all doing the best that we can to provide all of you the best service possible. Bear with us, for as the HIANG grows in strength, your CBPO has not been authorized any additional full-time or traditional guardsmen positions.

ORI Preperation

Maximum participation will be a key to the success of this exercise. Active duty days (AT) will be utilized. It is important that everyone plans ahead.
