COMMANDER RAPS WITH FIRST FOUR COUNCIL

"I earnestly solicit any recommendation on how to make this a better outfit. It is my sincere desire that the First Four Council will become a forum where airmen can sound off about things they don't like" .. With these comments Col. James R. Ashford opened the Aug. 12 meeting of the First Four Council. Furthermore, he stated, "I promise, (1) that I will seriously consider any recommendations or bitches that you have and (2) that I will get back to you with answers. HIANG MAN TRAVELS TO AFRICA

Ground Safety Technician, SSgt Glenn Miyashiro, recently traveled to Africa under the auspicies of the National Science Foundation. Glenn was a member of a three man team from the University of Hawaii which included Dr. Jack Zirker and Dr. Richard Wolf. They were in Chinquetti, Mauritania to perform special experiments associated with the recent solar eclipse. The eclipse lasted six minutes and 19 seconds. Glenn reports that another eclipse of this length will not appear until the year 2142.

The team performed two basic experiments using spectrographic analysis. The ultimate use of their findings will be to better understand how the sun produces energy, to determine how the sun's energy affects our solar system.


WIN COMMENDATION MEDALS

LOW RANKING GUARDSMEN ENTITLED TO BA

Washington, D.C. (NGAUS) A change in Defense Department policy now entitles National Guardsmen with less than four year service and under the rank of E-4 to draw quarters allowances for active duty of less than 30 days.

The change will mean a bigger payche for many Guardsmen attending annual trainin In the past, only duty of more than 30 days qualified a Guardsman or Reservist for Basi Allowance for Quarters (BAQ), but now the entitlements and pay allowances are the sam for Guardsmen as for the Active services.

In a recent interview 154th FIG Safety Officer, Maj. George Joy discussed the possible causes of the loss of a HIANG F-102. The pilot reported engine overheating registering 800 degrees and then complete engine failure on final emergency approach to runway 4R. At the time of engine failure the pilot was not in position to glide to the runway so he turned the aircraft away from the airport complex and ejected.

A Navy harbor clearnace unit was successful in recovering the engine of of the aircraft. This was the first time that HIANG had had the opportunity to examine an engine from an aircraft that had failed in flight. The accompanying picture taken by the safety team shows that the 1st and 9th stage compressor blades were quite undamaged. However, it is apparent that the remaining stages have been destroyed resulting

in complete engine failure.


It was the consensus of the investigating committee that the blade locking device of one of the blades in the 4th or 5th stages failed, thereby releasing one of the compressor blades which then destroyed the remaining blades. Thus it would seem to be a case of material failure although that can not be conclusively proved because the small locking device was not recovered.

On the plus side, Maj. Joy noted that the ejection and parachute systems functioned perfectly and offered his congratulations to the Egress Shop.

SENATE ARMED SERVICES COMMITTEE OK'S AIRCRAFT BUY FOR AIR GUARD

Washington, D.C. (NGAUS) The Senate Armed Services Committee recently approved a proposal that would earmark \$70 million to buy 24 A-7D aircraft specifically for the Air National Guard. If the proposal is approved by the full Congress and funds appropriated, it will be the first direct "buy" authorised for the Air Guard since the Korean War.

Maj. General Henry W. McMillan, NGAUS President, recently urged Congressional leaders to consider a modernization of the Air Guard fleet, with direct procurement authorization.
