SR-71 MAY TRY FOR SPEED RECORD

OFFUTT AFB, Neb (AFNS) - A Strategic Air Command SR-71 may try for a transatlantic speed record from New York to London in September, according to SAC officials here.

Weather and other factors permitting the aircraft would make the attempt during a routine overseas training mission. After the attempt, the recomnaissance aircraft will be on display Sept. 2-8 at the Farnborough International Airshow in Farnborough, England.

The Federation Aeronautique Internationale, accrediting organization for records in avation, will be asked to certify the record. The current record is held by a Royal Air Force F-4K fighter aircraft with a time of four hours and 46 minutes.

The SR-71, developed as a long-range advanced strategic recomnaissance aircraft is capable of flying at over 2,000 miles per hour.
