

199th Scores Darts and DACT!

It's been a busy few weeks since our last drill. Eight of our F-4C aircraft deployed to Kaneohe, Aug. 6th, to take part in live DART firing. The aircrews were scheduled to fly two sets of five sorties from the 6th to the 17th.


The dart target is one of the most alistic targets in the Air Force inventry. It is a balanced, winged vehicle constructed of a pinewood frame, honeycomb filler and an aluminum alloy skin. Its wing-span at the tail is 5' and overall length is 16'. The target is towed on a cable approx. 1500' behind a fighter and reacts in flight much like an actual aircraft. Dart firing exercises provide excellent air-to-air combat training for aircrews. For more info on how our pilots fared...see BREAK RIGHT on page 7.

Commanders Corner

During a recent visit to the public library, I had a chance to skim read an an alcove which focused on "how to succeed in..." Whether it was real estate, insurance sales or commercial selling, numerous "successful" authors identified several keys to success. A common element which threaded through these keys and served as a master key was the importance of being prepared.

"Being prepared" has been credited for sustaining self-motivation, heightened self confidence, influencing others effectively and insuring a successful game plan no matter what you're trying to sell. In many ways, we in the Composite Group have found that thorough preparation for the MEI and the ORI have yielded the kind of desired outcome we think is representative of the Group. By following our self-directed ORI/MEI checklist items, we have derived genuine confidence because we know our preparation is authentic and comprehensive. By practicing those activities we intend to encounter during the ORI we discover other concurrent results which require closer scrutiny to improve our total team effort. We have also found that preparation includes communication and coordination of our intent to all those on our team. Often our directed effort is misdirected because the light at the end of the tunnel can't be seen by all the participants.

If you still doubt the value of "being appropriately prepared" consider some of your bad personal experiences and think of how many of those adverse incidents could have been turned around through improved self preparation.



Participation in Opportune Journey also gave aircrews more experience in Dissimilar Aircraft Combat Tactics (DACT). During the last week of Aug. and the first week of Sept. our aircrews joined with five f-15s from the 43rd Tactical Fighter Squadron of the 21st Tactical Fighter Wing, Elmendorf, Alaska in providing air support for U.S. Army exercises at the Pohakuloa Training Area on the Big Island. Fighter aircraft, A-10s, from Massachusetts and Alaska played the role of providing direct air support to Army ground troops in live ammo exercises. The F-15s and our F-4s took turns in providing escort protection for the A-10s to and from Barbers Point NAS in a simulated war environment. At times, the F-15s would escort the A-10s and our F-4s played the role of attackers, then the F-15s and the F-4s switched roles.

It was the first time the F-15s ever participated in Opportune Journey. During the course of the exercise, aircrews flew 52 sorties, 24 the first week, 28 the second.

Lt Col. Mike Tice, Chief of Fighter Operations Branch, said the DACT training was a great opportunity in exercising in the escort scenario. And the role reversal also provided a tremendous gain in attack experience.

EDUCATIONAL BENEFITS FOR GUARD

The Defense Activity for Non-Traditional
'ucation Support (DANTES) testing program
s made available to members of the Air
National Guard Oct. 1 of last year.

This nationally recognized testing program offers unique opportunities to personnel to gain college credit by passing appropriate written exams (CLEP, ACT/PEP, DANTES, GRE and GMAT). These exams award general undergraduate credits and are offered at no cost excepting for the latter two.

Testing services are available through the Hickam Education Center. Testing is conducted at 8:30 a.m. on Mondays and Fridays and at 1:00 p.m. Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays. Scheduling must be done directly with the Education Center and is necessary as a minimum of five people are required before any given exam may be conducted.

All personnel are encouraged to take advantage of college credit earned through this program and are urged to enroll in an accredited degree program. Enlisted members enroll in the Community College of the Force so their military schools and perience may count toward an Associate gree.

HANG members may obtain a letter of eligibility from the 154th Consolidated Base Personnel Office if determined to be in good standing and if they have at least two years of retainability. This letter along with the member's current I.D. is necessary to enroll in the DANTES program. Unfortunately, testing services are not available on the neighbor islands and unless there is access to organic military air transportation, such costs must be born by the participating individual.

S PAY NOTES S_

Pay delay: Part of the submission with the 7 Sep pay date was not transmitted by the Comm Center. Our investigation revealed that it was due to operator error and transmission line problems. Of the 1460 cards transmitted, only 836 cards were received by AFAFC. There was also no sequence to which card transmitted; i.e., 5 cards transmitted, the next 3 did not, the next 4 cards transmitted, etc. On the next day, the housing/COLA submission also encountered problems as 496 of the 1491 cards paid. The unpaid "cards" have been retransmitted to pay on 21 Sep 84.

Pay problems occur for various reasons. We submit an average of 1500 AF Forms 458/HANG Forms 1 and 1000 NGB Form 105 (cards) for pay and calculate over 250 travel vouchers per month. With this volume and the other pay documents, errors do occur. It has happened at AFAFC, the Comm Center, this office, your unit or from you. We will attempt to solve the problems as quickly as possible but need the assistance of the units and individuals to minimize the problems from their/your end. The following are examples of problems that have occurred during the past 4-5 months:

- a. If you are under "Sure Pay" and received your AF Form 1965 (earnings statement) earlier than expected, be sure to check the Sure-Pay date on the top of the statement. Many times the statement are sent out 2-3 days early and the funds have not been deposited in the bank.
- b. American Savings & Loan has requested that if you have an account with them and plan to apply for Sure-Pay, please send the SF 1199A to them first. They stated that too many people have been annotating incorrect account numbers on the SF 1199A.
- c. Although it has been improving, we continue to receive incomplete or incorrect AF Forms 458 and NGB Form 105s. In the month of Aug 84, for example, we sent 95 letters requesting correction of documentation. This does not include the ones corrected via telephone calls.

- d. We also send out letters periodically to units because we have outstanding active duty tour cards that have no AF Form 458 submitted nor revocation orders (if the tour was not performed). Last week, for example, we finally received a revocation for a tour that was not performed in Dec 1983!
- e. We have had several cases where individuals have been overpaid on their travel vouchers and collection actions had to be taken by 15ABWg because the individual failed to declare the advances he had requested and received prior to his trip. Then when filing his/her travel voucher, the individual declared "none" in the block for travel advances. The 15ABWg Travel section consider this a very serious matter and has brought this to the attention of the Comptroller's office and the unit involved.
- f. If an individual comes back early from a long tour, an amendment should be published as soon as possible and this office notified by telephone. Delay could cause overpayment and subsequent collection action. Two individuals that arrived back on 27 Jul which was prior to their original tour end date was recently overpaid. On one individual, the amendment was not published until 22 Aug!
- g. Enlistment packages are forwarded to CBPO to gain a new member from the GSUs. If the package is incomplete, the member may not be gained if vital information is missing and therefore, will not be paid. We had a recent example of this which resulted in a member's pay submission being rejected.

As a final note, the pay submission schedules are sent to each unit administration.



PARENT LOAN PROGRAM FROM THE AIR FORCE AID SOCIETY (AFAS)

Did you know the AFAS has a Parent Loan Program (an extension of the existing Arnold Guaranteed Student Loan Program)? Under the Parent Loan Program, an eligible parent can borrow up to \$3,000 per academic year -- to a maximum of \$15,000 -on behalf of each dependent undergraduate student. There is no "needs test" for the Parent Loans as there is for Student Loans. Also, a Parent Loan can be received regardless of whether or not the student is borrowing under the Arnold Frogram (providing of course that the educational costs are not exceeded). Interest rates are 12%.

Commander in Chief, Pacific Air Forces, Sen. Jerome F. O'Malley leaves Pacific Air Forces Sept. 25 to take over command of the Tactical Air Command.

President Reagan has nominated Lt. Gen. Robert W. Bazley to Replace Gen. O'Malley. General Bazley is currently the Air Force's Inspector General.

General Bazley was commissioned in 1945 and received his pilot's wings in 1954. He flew as a navigator during the Korean War and logged 257 combat missions as a pilot in F-100s over Southeast Asia.

An Air Force spokesman said General Bazley has not been nominated for promotion


TUITION WAVER HANG-UPS

During the recent fall semester registration, a few of our members in the tuition waiver program encountered some difficulties Basically, the problems occurred because the dates on the certification forms were more than three months prior to registration or the authorizing signatures were not original

The above requirements help to insure that the following intentions of the tuition waiver program are met:

- a. The member is a satisfactory HANG performer.
 - b. The member meets ETS requirement.
- c. The tuition applicant is, in fact, a HANG member.

It is a frustrating experience to stan in a long line and be informed at the final station that the certification form is unacceptable. To prevent further occurrence of these unpleasent circumstances, please insure that you have the original certification of eligibility and that the date is no more than three months prior to registration.





CHAMPUS CLAIMS BEING DENIED TO PEOPLE NOT ENROLLED IN DEERS

People eligible for military medical benefits who aren't enrolled in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting system may soon wish they were.

Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services (CHAMPUS) claims are now being denied in several states for those whose names do not appear in the DEERS computer system. By the end of the year, this policy will be in effect in every state.

Bonning 15 Oct 84, military hospitals and clinics in Hawaii will also use DEERS to ify the eligibility of dependents to receive nonemergency care from those facilities. Those not enrolled by then will be refused care. No one will be denied emergency care in a military facility. However, dependents of members of AGR and tours of 30 days or more must be enrolled by their sponsors.

YOUR PERSONNEL RECORD

"It is my Personnel Record, it belongs to me." No, not quite. The Unit Personnel Record Group, AF Form 10 and associated documents, do indeed only pertain to you as an individual, but are officially Air Force documents rather than your personal property. You are entitled to copies of documents contained in the file, and you may review your record in the Records on during normal duty hours. AFR 35-44, para 2-20, states specifically that ch review must take place "where the records are maintained." In other words, you may not remove your own records or documents in them from the CBPO office. (DPMA: 449-5669)

ATTN: 209X MONITORS

Now that you have been appointed, remember you are responsible for ensuring forms submitted to CBPO are prepared, authenticated and submitted in accordance with the tables and examples listed in AFM 30-130, Vol II, Chap 3. In addition, you will initial and date the "unit" block in Section VIII, remove the last copy of the form labeled "unit suspense" and retain in you suspense pending receipt of the completed action from CBPO.

RECORD OF ACADEMIC EDUCATION DATA (ENLISTED)

Is the education data in your records accurate and complete? All personnel claiming college credits should bring in a copy of their transcript or a copy of their diploma to be placed in their record. The CBPO Customer Service/Records Section is responsible for updating this document. Updating increments of semester hours are as follows: 15-29 semester hours, 30-59 semester hours, 60-89 semester hours, Award of Associate, Baccalaureate or higher degrees should be annotated in their personnel records.

CIVILIAN AIRCRAFT QUALIFICATION

CBPO has the capability to update commercial aircraft information in your personnel record. Data elements include commercial airline employer, position, and airline flown/serviced.

OFFICER PHOTOGRAPH PROGRAM

IAW AFR 36-93, it is the officer's basic responsibility to make sure there is an up-to-date photograph in the selection folder. Since the photo is used in the selection process for promotion, it is to the officer's distinct advantage to take a photograph promptly when directed and to update it voluntarily. Officers must conform to dress and personal appearance standards in AFR 30-1 and 35-10. The common errors we notice in official photos are: 1. The placement of devices (i.e., OLCs and stars) on ribbons, 2. Improper alignment of the U.S. insignia, and 3. Hair exceeds regulation length. Officers have two UTA drills to have photos taken after initial notification. (DPMA: 449-5669)

SERVICEMEN'S GROUP LIFE INSURANCE

Effective 1 July 1984, the monthly SGLI premium deduction has been reduced. The monthly cost for SGLI under the new rate is listed below:

One of the most important documents you receive each year is your Point Credit Summary. Make sure it is accurate. Furnish documentation to CBPO regarding any errors. We will notify you of any action taken.

CERTIFICATE OF AVAILABILITY FEDERAL EMPLOYEE

If a guard member is a civilian employee of the federal government a completed Certificate of Availability must be completed and filed in your Unit Personnel Record Group. Any changes in your employment with the federal government, for example: promotions, supervisor changes, etc., a new certificate of availibility must be completed.

TIMELY SUBMISSION OF DECORATIONS

Recommending an individual for a decoration can be one of the most tangible rewards supervisors have to recognize their people for a job well done. Awards have a direct impact on promotions and contribute significantly to morale. Unfortunately, some supervisors are not initiating awards in a timely manner. Once the Recommendation for Decoration (RDP) computer product is generated, supervisors have 30 days to submit the recommendation to CBPO for verification. If it is going to be over 30 days, a letter of explanation for delay in submitting the recommendation must be attached with the recommendation. We need your assistance to encourge commanders and supervisors to submit award recommendations in a timely manner. With your help, we can ensure that deserving members receive appropriate recognition for their accomplishments.
