A Christmas Story – 50 Years in the Making


Christmas is a time for telling stories, so I'll tell one of the best I know. It is a true story. It is our story.

It was a warm winter day in Hawaii, 50 years ago when the 154th Wing was born. Maybe this catches some of us by surprise because the HIANG is more than 60 years old. All of us know that our aircraft are less than 50 years old. And frankly, nothing has been said about the Wing's 50th birthday coming up – no ceremonies, no formations, no limited edition 154th Wing 50 Year Anniversary apparel. Nonetheless, the 154th Wing began on its illustrious path on Dec. 1, 1960. First,

a little background: the 199th Fighter Squadron dates back to 1944, when pilots who would later be attached to the then still non-existent 199th were training in the Republic P-47 Thunderbolt. The P-47 Thunderbolt, also known as the "Jug," was, by far, the largest, heaviest and most expensive single-engine fighter aircraft in aviation history. The young pilots, maintainers, and support personnel destined for the 199th didn't have

much time to get accustomed to it before, they found themselves fighting in Okinawa a year later. Later on, on May 28, 1946, the unit to which those pilots were attached, the 464th Fighter Squadron, was renamed the 199th Fighter Interceptor Squadron and were assigned to the Hawaii Air National Guard. Pilots who had spent most of their careers in Colorado, Nebraska, and Texas found themselves in beautiful Hawaii, which has been protected by the 199th ever since.






Hawaii Air Guardsmen of today can relate to the 199th of old. They are, after all, our HIANG Ohana relatives. More than that, today's HIANG is now going through many of the challenges and changes that its predecessors did. They were, while in the middle of a world conflict, undergoing a complete restructuring, working with minimal manning, and anticipating numerous airframe and personnel changes. In 1947, when the 199th became part of the HIANG, there were only 29 officers and 45 enlisted personnel. The highest ranked officer was a captain. The highest enlisted rank was master sergeant. Though having joined the HIANG with a relatively new aircraft, during the next 10 years, the airframes would change two more times:

to the F-86E Sabre and then to the F-86L Sabre, which they flew until 1960.

Fast forward to the present day and it is clear that the changes we have been going through with thousands of personnel, our HIANG ancestors were going through with less than 100 – and on a much lower pay scale.

Even with all of the differences between the HIANG today and the HIANG of old, there is one constant: the amazing accomplishments and capabilities of the HIANG then are but a reflection of our accomplishments and capabilities of today – only today they are done on a much greater scale. That brings us to the 154th Wing


and its 50th birthday. The year 1960 was not only the end of the F-86L Sabre in the HIANG and start of the F-102A Delta Dagger Interceptors, but also the birth of the 154th Wing. The Wing was formed initially as the 154th Fighter Group on Dec. 1 that year and was organized to accommodate the HIANG mission requirements, growth and the increased manning of the 199th, along with the transition to the F-102, "Deuce,"

which was flown by the 199th for more than fifteen years hence. At the same time, amidst receiving a completely new and very different fighter airframe from what the pilots were used to, while experiencing significant organizational and personnel changes, a communist group going by the name of 'Viet Cong' was busy in South Vietnam, establishing their National Liberation Front and being closely watched by America and its allies. Here, we have another reflection of the past, another resemblance to our future. Fourteen years before, it was World War II and the forming of the 199th with the new Thunderbolt. And now, fifty years later, it is the War on Terrorism, the forming of many new units, including new associate units for both the KC-135 and our own generation's new fighter aircraft, the F-22 Raptor. History certainly does repeat itself, and yet we grow and excel with every turn.

The Christmas story of the 154th Wing is ultimately a story of service, giving, caring, ohana, and of aloha. Like any story, like any history, if not kept, remembered, and passed on, it will be forgotten. A reflection forever lost. This is a tale too good to forget...Never forget...
