II. Open Remarks

- Luke Meyers/Darryl Oliveira Welcome, call meeting to order, and roll call. Thank you for participating to share insight and wisdom in Emergency Management mission across the State. a.) Hawaii

Darryl Oliveira | William Bergin

- Darryl Oliveira: Welcome Dr. Bergin and thank you for interest in becoming a HACEM Member. Dr. Bergin is a very well-respected member of the community, both he and his entire family. Acknowledge the HI-EMA Team that has been present with the Community Meetings in support of our County Management Team and HVO. Ensuring the community is well informed, how they could be better prepared, and take action to care for themselves for those rural areas where limited in resources and infrastructure. It will require a community effort to prevent injury or worse from occurring, look forward to the update. It is interesting to hear from HACEM Members on different perspectives of the resilience hubs or resilience efforts in the community. There are numerous different models and concepts of resilience, but the core, is really the community coming together and aligning with Emergency Management or with government, and how to care for themselves.
- William (Billy) Bergin: I parallel serve on a Mauna Kea Management Advisory Board, so I understand the parameters within which we work. Will try to attend all meetings to ensure a quorum is achieved and the importance to serve in a physical capacity as well as virtual. Luke Meyers With Dr. Bergin's unique background having to do with animals, we have incidents where we look at property, facilities, and infrastructure/operations which has a lot of impacts on animals. This, along with his other interest will bring new perspective to the table as part of his HACEM service.

c.) Oahu

Gerry Silva | Ron Cox | Mona Curry

• Gerry Silva: As State AARP President, hosted four successful webinars with a focus on the elderly. In addition to, John Cummings from City and County Department of Emergency Management (DEM), came to talk to people about safety in high rises, where to shelter there, etc. There are 320 high rises on this island, and some are not great shelter options. Moving forward, AARP has incorporated this series of webinars in its 2023 Plan.

<u>Glenda Nogami-Streufert</u> – With webinars, there may be many of the elderly that are not able to get onto the internet. In place of webinars, seminars could be convened, or the AARP can convene in community meetings. In Kauai there are areas that may not have the internet access or not easily accessible.

<u>HI-EMA Response</u> – Webinar distribution, could be placed on thumb drives to interested parties. Another Statewide idea is AARP partnering with Lowes, City Mill, Target, etc.

Considering the recent hurricane in Florida, there are large retirement communities impacted where there was storm surge and the wind situations. May be opportunity for connection with Florida AARP.

- Mona Curry: Personal update sharing the I have resigned my position with FEMA, as a Division Supervisor within the Operations Cadre. The position sends me around the nation for months at a time and as I am expecting my first grandchild, I have decided to make myself more available at home for the next few months. I'd like to also share an update with you on the innovative Hauula Resilience HUB project. The architectural design is near the 75% completion mark. d.) Kauai

Glenda Nogami-Streufert

Glenda Nogami-Streufert Interest in resilient center(s). Kauai's Northshore has Resilience Hubs in Hanalei and are developing a Resilience Center in Wainiha. Costs have increased in the last couple of years. When development starts, you need to anticipate the inflation margins, this is usually the budgeting factor that is not projected high enough. Ni'ihau- Has no Emergency Warning System and is an isolated community. Incident Action Plan and Management Plan – Looking at creating due to gatherings at block parties on Kauai (i.e., Rice Street), because of the South Korean, Soul district incident. Natural Disasters – Nothing to report. Building Codes – Discussion. Referencing Fort Meyers Florida – Building codes we are up to code, therefore provided excess sheltering space.

COVID – We are still providing COVID testing around the island. Have more visitors than year prior, and there is interest in testing especially for travelers departing and going back home. <u>HI-EMA Response</u> – There has been progress and are actively working siren investment with learned lessons from building codes with DAGS. Siren work on Ni'ihau, it was confirmed pending equipment.

- **Hawaii** Talmage Magno: Not present, sends his regards.
- Maui Herman Andaya: Not present, sends his regards.
- **Kauai** Elton Ushio: Robinson Family on Ni'ihau Siren It was confirmed the components were in excellent condition, all the components work. One part pending from DOE due to supply chain issue, anticipating receipt in May-June 2023. After installation of last pieces, will ensure the siren is fully operational and will have VIP meet with Mr. Robinson and test sounding of sirens. Hurricane Iniki remembrance, appreciate the opportunity to share, messaging the larger set of hazards. Building Codes and processes in Hawaii, I think it would be interesting to see the comparison to Fort Myers in Florida's rebuilding and experiences they have based upon 30 years before. Innovative Readiness Training Program, providing humanitarian assistance because of most catastrophic care. KEMA is partnering with and working with for an assessment. First NET Broad Band on Kauai. Act 12/35 Thank you to HI-EMA on Hazard Mitigation. Levy rehabilitation Hoping to partner with the Army Corps. Hiring Fiscal Staff Officer. EMPG funding received.

<u>HI-EMA Response</u> – Wilcox Hospital Center- The backup generators are new, the old were donated to the Public Facilities for Kauai.

Oahu – Hiro Toiya: Focusing on shelter space, working with here and now and how to use currently. In 2020 CARES Funding was used to assess. We selected facilities priority and are assessing; those being assessed now. The North Shore and Kailua have no facilities, the Windward side is sparse. American Red Cross has limited resource on island for pre-impact. Another project is the communication "easy to consume".
 HI-EMA Response – Improving the building from conception, new builds at least one portion of

the structure should be built to the new permitting and planning hurricane specifications.

- Matthew Wall, Operations Branch: Explanation of priorities Hurricane season, planning, training, and exercise. Focus will be on the NLE 2024, which requires some revision of the existing training and exercise schedule as moving forward.

- Lorinda Wong-Lau, Resilience Branch: Retrofit Program history/brief. Programmatic Review. Hazard Mitigation updates. Process of evaluating and working with the Counties, opened dialog with the Counties and DAGS. Shelters looking at location, retrofit verified. DAGS projects seem to manage well, it is longer term and using match opportunity to increase funding.
