

When Ron came on board as the new Director of the Hawai'i Office of Veterans Services in July, 2011, I made it a point to go meet him in his office during his first week on the job. I was Federal Employee working at VAPIHCS at the time, but I had a "bug in my bonnet" that I simply had to share with Ron. During my time as President/CEO, Hawai'i Health Systems Corporation (HHSC) 1997 to 2009, I helped build Hawai'i's first State Veterans Home in Hilo and set it up operationally under the East Hawai'i Region, HHSC. It opened in 2007. As part of my due diligence, I made a commitment to the Governors State Advisory Board on Veterans Services, to build a second State Veterans Home on O'ahu. I wanted to convey that commitment to Ron and asked him to join me in the quest to build the 2nd State Veterans Home on O'ahu.


Although "drinking from a fire hose" with info flow in his first week as Director at OVS, he jumped on this idea with both hands and feet. This was the beginning of a close personal friendship between Ron and me that lasted until he most unfortunately passed away in 2023. There are too many stories of overcoming unsurmountable challenges for me to relate here, but suffice to say that our second State Veterans Home for O'ahu was dead in the water multiple times over the next 10 years, but

every time it was being closed out, Ron took aggressive personal action to deal with and overcome each challenge. He simply refused to allow this project to fail. Yes, he had a great team and yes everyone on the team worked very hard to promote this project, but only Ron was able to accomplish the impossible time after time and finally made it a reality. I am both privileged and honored to have served with Ron in pursuit of this dream and I feel qualified to say I have never worked with nor know a finer person or greater leader that Ron Han!!! He always gave of himself for everyone else and never asked for anything in return. He was a Military Leader, Veterans Leader, Husband, and Father for us all. He truly was the one person we should all attempt to emulate. He will always be sorely missed, but never forgotten.

Office of Veterans' Services New Kapolei Location at the Daniel K. Akaka CBOC

Col. Ronald P. Han was instrumental in getting this office space in the new Daniel Kahikina Akaka Veterans Affairs Community Based Outpatient Clinic (CBOC) on Franklin D Roosevelt Ave in Kapolei.

Getting to the Tripler Army Medical Center (TAMC) can be stressful because it is so big and parking can be an issue. It was Ron's goal to find space on the west side of the island to service veterans.

This project/goal came to fruition when the Akaka VA CBOC opened on April 8. The Office of Veterans' Services (OVS) has three counselor offices in the new Akaka VA CBOC. These counselors help with filing

disability claims to the VA (initial, new, supplemental, increase, higher level review and appeals) advocate veterans concerns, counsel benefits, provide informational referrals and claims submission, and offer VA forms and appeals assistance.

To make an appointment with a counselor, please call 808-433-0420. Once assigned a counselor, they will contact you to schedule an appointment.

The Office Assistant Lawrence Ilustre can take care of the motor vehicle exemptions and provides the property tax forms, a program through the City & County.

Office hours are from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and we are closed from

12:00 p.m. to 1:00 p.m. for lunch.

The counselors are accepting walkins Tuesday through Thursday from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.

Before working for OVS, senior counselor Melegalenuu "Mele" Sene-Whitehead worked at U.S. VETS as a case manager for Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF), assisting veterans at risk of losing their homes and dealing with homelessness. She was born and raised in American Samoa and graduated from the University of Hawai'i in Hilo in Psychology. Her passion is helping people, especially veterans and their families as she is from a military family herself. Mele is the daughter of a Viet-

nam War veteran who served in the U.S. Marine Corps and is a spouse of a retired U.S. Army Veteran.

Prior to working for OVS, Veterans Services Counselor Carolyn Visoria spent four years at U.S. VETS Barber's Point working as a Case Manager and Team Lead for SSVF. She graduated from the University of Hawai'i at Manoa in Public Health in 2016 and spent seven years working at local non-profits before joining the OVS team in 2023. As the daughter of an Army veteran, Carolyn is dedicated to serving veterans,

their families and the local community.

Veterans Services Counselor Sabrina Kepa'a has worked within state, federal and non-profit organizations for over 20 years, helping individuals and families become self-sufficient. During her previous role, she was an advocate assisting veterans with obtaining benefits, employment and permanent housing. Both of Sabrina's grandfathers were veterans. She believes every interaction — whether positive or negative — teaches valuable lessons. These lessons focus on spreading kindness, as you never know what others are going through. Sabrina is deeply rooted by her faith and Hawaiian values, and believes cherishing moments with loved ones is what truly matters.

The Daniel Kahikina Akaka VA CBOC was completed on budget and on time. The \$130 million, 88,675 square-foot multi-specialty outpatient clinic will provide primary, mental and specialty health care; x-ray, laboratory and diagnostic services; and a pharmacy for Veterans on O'ahu. There are an estimated 15,000 Veterans living on the west side of O'ahu, for which this new clinic means easier access to VA care.

The new facility is part of a larger plan to expand services in the Pacific Islands. The Kona CBOC will also move to a larger location, and other clinics are seeing renovations or expansions across the islands.
