- A Major Change in Operation Principle and Policy. The following article is a compilation of several that describes the DOD Directive 120017, Managing the Reserve Components as an Operational Force, dated and effective October 29, 2008. This Directive establishes the overarching set of principles and policies to promote and support the management of the Reserve Components (RCs) as an operational force.

The debate appears to be over – officially - as to whether the reserve components have morphed from a Cold War strategic force to a present-day operational force. The Pentagon late last month to little or no fanfare published two documents:

One, a white paper titled "Managing the Reserve Components as an Operational Force," and



Two, an accompanying DOD directive No. 1200.17.



Both documents state: "The reserve components provide operational capabilities and strategic depth to meet the nation's defense requirements across the full spectrum of conflict." As the white paper notes, the debate started right after the 1991 Gulf War, which employed "large numbers of reserve forces" that were "deployed quickly, early in the conflict, alongside the active component forces." But it really took hold after 9/11. Since that fateful day, National Guard and Reserve forces have been engaged in the war on terror "in different ways and at unprecedented levels," states the white paper.

Since Desert Storm, the Pentagon has made some changes in reserve force management, but the white paper indicates it took the war on terror to recognize that "incremental changes at the

margin" are not sufficient and, more importantly, that the change to an operational force is "not temporary." Issuance of the new directive, states the white paper, enables DOD "to codify" the new management approach beyond previously used policy memoranda.

The new direction asserts that the reserve forces must have necessary staffing, training, and equipment but, since "resources are not unlimited," the reserve forces "must be flexible and agile" to enable them to "transition between strategic and operational roles as needed." The white paper cautions against overuse of the "part-time" reserve force, and it emphasizes the desirability of volunteer service vice mobilization. In fact, it states, "The expanded operational use of the Guard and Reserve is built on a construct of voluntary service" in its evolving "continuum of service structure."

• Navy implements a new "No Guest Policy" at the Pearl Harbor Commissary. The new policy goes into effect on December 8, 2008 at the Pearl Harbor commissary. To reduce overcrowding and provide a more enjoyable shopping experience in a safe surrounding, beginning on Monday, December 8, 2008, only authorized commissary patrons will be allowed entry into the commissary. Authorized commissary patrons will no longer be permitted to sponsor guests into the Pearl Harbor commissary. As the new policy go into effect, commissary employees are still required to conduct a 100% ID card check both Front & Back at the Front Entrance Door and again at the cash register prior to starting your transaction. So to speed up your process, please have your ID card out and ready for the cashier to begin processing your groceries. Authorized commissary patrons are reminded that all dependent children 10 years old and older are required to have a valid ID card in their possession when accompanying their parents into the commissary. Thank you for your patience and understanding

All Authorized Commissary Patrons must adhere to COMNAVREG INSTRUCTION 1330.21, Subject: Authorized Patrons of the Navy Exchange and Defense Commissary Agency. This policy is to protect the authorized patron's commissary benefit. It is the responsibility of the all authorized patrons to ensure compliance of the instruction. • Guard's First Four-Star General Takes Office. WASHINGTON, Nov. 18, 2008 - Air Force Gen. Craig R. McKinley pinned on his fourth star and became chief of the National Guard Bureau in a ceremony at the Pentagon yesterday. Defense Secretary Robert M. Gates and Navy Adm. Mike Mullen, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, joined McKinley's wife, daughter, and son in adding the new star to the general's uniform. More than 300 people from all ranks, services, and many states' National Guards then watched Gates swear in McKinley as the first four-star general to lead the National Guard in its 372-year history.

"The promotion of Gen. Craig McKinley to this rank, to serve in this post, is in recognition of his outstanding leadership abilities and shows the confidence the president and I have in him to be the nation's senior Guard officer at such a critical time," Gates said.

McKinley succeeds Army Lt. Gen. H Steven Blum, who served in the post for more than five years and in January will become deputy commander of U.S. Northern Command, the first Guard officer to hold that position. McKinley joins George Washington, Ulysses S. Grant and two other former four-star officers who served as Guardsmen during their military careers.

"It's a rich and high honor to be the 26th chief of the National Guard Bureau," McKinley said.
"I will give it every bit of energy, every bit of heart and soul that I can possess to make sure that our National Guard and our soldiers and airmen are well taken care of, and I will work very

closely and faithfully with the services." Of the nation's more than 460,000 citizen-soldiers and -Airmen, some 68,000 Army and 5,700 Air Guard members are on active duty today for operations Noble Eagle, Enduring Freedom, and Iraqi Freedom. On any given day, an average of 17 governors call out their National Guard for a variety of domestic needs, Guard Bureau officials said.

McKinley is the fourth Air National Guard officer to serve as chief of the National Guard Bureau. He most recently served as director for the Air National Guard. There, he was responsible for policies, plans, and programs affecting more than 106,000 Airmen. Gates said McKinley successfully led the Air Guard during a time of severe manpower reductions and major challenges posed by the global war on terrorism, base realignment and closure implementation, budget changes and the transformation of the National Guard from a strategic reserve to an operational force.

McKinley received his Air Force commission in 1974 after graduating from Southern Methodist University in Dallas with a degree in business administration. He holds master's degrees in management and economics and in national security strategy. He is a command pilot with more than 4,000 flight hours. (American Forces Press Service)

The Department of Defense launched the National Resource Directory, a collaborative effort between the departments of Defense, Labor, and Veterans Affairs. The directory is a Web-based network of care coordinators, providers, and support partners with resources for wounded, ill, and injured service members, veterans, their families, families of the fallen and those who support them.

"The directory is the visible demonstration of our national will and commitment to As new links are added each day by providers and partners, coverage from coast to coast will grow even greater ensuring that no part of that journey will ever be made alone," said Lynda C. Davis, Ph.D., deputy under secretary of defense for military community and family policy.

Located at <a href="http://www.nationalresourcedirectory.org">http://www.nationalresourcedirectory.org</a>, the directory offers more than 10,000 medical and non-medical services and resources to help service members and veterans achieve personal and professional goals along their journey from recovery through rehabilitation to community reintegration.

"The VA is extremely proud to be a partner in this innovative resource. This combination of federal, state, and community-based resources will serve as a tremendous asset for all service members, veterans, their families, and those who care for them. The community is essential to the successful reintegration of our veterans, and these groups greatly enhance the directory's scope," said Karen S. Guice, M.D., executive director, federal recovery care coordination program at the Department of Veterans Affairs.

"The National Resource Directory will prove to be a valuable tool for wounded, ill, and injured service members and their families as they wind their way through the maze of benefits and services available to them in their transition to civilian life. The Department of Labor is pleased to have the opportunity to work with our partners at DoD," said Charles S. Ciccolella, the assistant secretary of labor for the veterans' employment and training service.

The National Resource Directory is organized into six major categories: Benefits and Compensation; Education, Training and Employment; Family and Caregiver Support; Health; Housing and Transportation; and Services and Resources. It also provides helpful checklists, Frequently Asked Questions, and connections to peer support groups. All information on the Web site can be found through a general or state and local search tool. • <u>Saluting During the Playing of the National Anthem</u>. Veterans and servicemembers not in uniform can now render the military-style hand salute during the playing of the national anthem, thanks to changes in federal law that took effect in October.

"The military salute is a unique gesture of respect that marks those who have served in our nation's armed forces," said Dr. James B. Peake, secretary of Veterans Affairs. "This provision allows the application of that honor in all events involving our nation's flag."

The new provision improves upon a little known change in federal law last year that authorized veterans to render the military-style hand salute during the raising, lowering or passing of the flag, but it did not address salutes during the national anthem. Last year's provision also applied to servicemembers while not in uniform.

Traditionally, members of the nation's veterans service organizations have rendered the handsalute during the national anthem and at events involving the national flag while wearing their organization's official head-gear.

Senator Jim Inhofe of Oklahoma, an Army veteran, sponsored the most recent change, authorizing hand-salutes during the national anthem by veterans and out-of-uniform military personnel. It was included in the Defense Authorization Act of 2009, which President Bush signed October 14, 2008.

The earlier provision authorizing hand-salutes for veterans and out-of-uniform servicemembers during the raising, lowering, or passing of the flag, was contained in the National Defense Authorization Act of 2008, which took effect January 28, 2008. (Courtesy of VA News)
