






NEW WAILUKU ARMORY, WAILUKU, MAUI

INTRODUCTION

The Military Department, comprising the Headquarters of the Hawaii National Guard, is organized to carry out duties pertaining to administration, training, supply, construction and transportation normally delegated to a command equivalent to a brigade of infantry. The department is organized into the following sections:

1. Personnel
2. Intelligence
3. Plans and Training
4. Supply, Finance, Construction and Transportation
5. Territorial Staff Group (Medical, Legal, Administrative, Inspection, Transportation and Supply)

There is great need of additional permanent clerical assistance in this department as it often happens that in the absence of a section head there is no one available to take his place.

Office Administration—On December 8, 1937, Captain Dean R. DeMerritt, A. G. D., succeeded Captain Joseph I. deVille, Finance Dept., as Administrative Assistant of the department. The volume of routine correspondence handled by this headquarters is very heavy, in excess of approximately 9,000 communications being handled yearly.

The following units have been authorized by the National Guard Bureau to be organized, but owing to the delay in construction of armories for these new units, there has not been any organization to date:

Headquarters & Headquarters Co., 3rd Bn., 299th Infantry—proposed location, Lihue, Kauai.

Company I, 299th Infantry—proposed location, Hanapepe, Kauai.

Company M, 299th Infantry—proposed location, Lihue, Kauai.

Though Company K, 299th Infantry, temporarily stationed at Hoolehua, Molokai was mustered into service on April 26, 1937, it is still using temporary quarters loaned this department by the Hawaiian Homes Commission. It was originally understood that the Hawaii National Guard was not to occupy the building for a period greater than three months. However, the long delay in getting the new armory at Kaunakakai built has required Company K to continue to use these temporary quarters. From present prospects it will be six months longer before a Territorial armory for Kaunakakai, the first to be built on Molokai, will be ready for occupancy.

The unfortunate condition that exists for Company K of the 299th Infantry is that the Hawaiian Homes Commission's gymnasium, the present temporary quarters, is not considered by the Commanding General, Hawaiian Department, USA, a safe place for the storage of federal military equipment, with the result that no weapons have been allowed to be in the possession of that organization. The situation at present is that although this company has been in the National Guard of the United States and of the Territory for fourteen months, the men have not yet had their training in the principal arm of the infantry—the rifle.

Strength—The strength allotted the active Hawaii National Guard at present is set at 122 commissioned officers, 2 warrant officers and 1,819 enlisted men. The strength of the Hawaii National Guard on June 30, 1938, was 1,840 Active officers and men, and 274 Inactive officers and men, as follows:

2nd SECTION—PLANS AND TRAINING

Capt. James T. M. Chang, 298th Inf., Acting Chief of Section

Armory Training—The training of the Hawaii National Guard during the past fiscal year has been very satisfactory. Training policies governing the training of the National Guard are issued by the Chief of the National Guard Bureau and the Commanding General, Hawaiian Department. In the event of national emergency, it is believed that the Hawaii National Guard will be assigned important missions in the Hawaiian Department.

During the past fiscal year the two regiments have more closely functioned together in various phases of training. The two regimental bands have been practicing together and can now function as one unit. The radio sections are now training together and operating under the net control station located in Honolulu. Radio stations have been established at Hilo, Waialuku and Honolulu. These three sets were installed through the courtesy of the U. S. Coast Guard. It is hoped that Molokai will have a station in the very near future. These stations are restricted to operation on an assigned net and frequencies. The Honolulu station goes on the air every day at noon and in the evening. The regimental headquarters companies' radio sections train together in this phase of training.

It is very fortunate that the Hawaii National Guard has several excellent engineers who are giving professional training to our young Guardsmen. A well-conducted class was established in Honolulu during the past fiscal year on Military Intelligence, which includes the reading and making of military maps. It is proposed to have the intelligence sections of the 298th and 299th Infantries train together beginning with the fiscal year 1939.

Marksmanship—One of the greatest problems in the training of National Guardsmen is marksmanship. So much time is required in training on this subject and training during daylight is very essential. The regular drills are conducted in the evening for one and one-half hours each week. The officers and men do not receive any remuneration whatsoever for a great part of marksmanship training. Very often the officers and men have to furnish their own transportation to and from the target ranges and also their own meals. The present course in rifle marksmanship will be changed beginning January 1, 1939.

During the fiscal year 1938 the Military Department conducted two National Rifle Match competitions. One was for the selection of an Hawaii National Guard Rifle Team and the other for the selection of a Territorial Civilian Rifle Team for participation in the National Matches at Camp Perry, Ohio. Due to insufficient funds appropriated by Congress, the War Department allotted only enough money to send the Hawaii National Guard Team. The Hawaii National Guard

Rifle Team, captained by Colonel P. M. Smoot, with ten shooting members, two alternates and one team coach, participated in the National Matches at Camp Perry, Ohio, from August 22 to September 11, 1937. Pay, transportation, allowances and subsistence were paid from federal funds. The team made an excellent showing with a score of 2674, placing 22nd (Class "B") out of a field of 122 competing rifle teams from all branches of the military service, including civilian and police teams from every state of the union. This was the first team to represent the Hawaii Guard at the National Matches since 1931. Only one other team, that of 1927, was classified in Class "B."

Four small bore indoor rifle matches were conducted during the fiscal year 1938. These matches were sponsored by the National Rifle Association in Washington, D. C. The trophies and awards were donated by the Chief of the National Guard Bureau, the National Rifle Association and William Randolph Hearst of the Hearst News Syndicate. The teams and individuals competed not only against each other here in Hawaii but also against National Guard units and individuals throughout the mainland United States. In the Chief, National Guard Bureau Indoor Company Team Match, in which 291 National Guard units throughout the United States participated, the Hawaii National Guard teams placed as follows:

Each of the members on the team of Headquarters Company, 298th Infantry received bronze medals. First Sergeant William F. Keiek, Headquarters Company, 298th Infantry was awarded a bronze medal for being one of the two highest competitors in the 9th Corps Area (which included Hawaii) in the Chief, National Guard Bureau Indoor Rifle Individual Match. He placed 19th among the 136 entrants. In the Chief of the National Guard Bureau Indoor Rifle Regimental Team Match, the 298th Infantry placed 10th among the 33 teams. Company E, 298th Infantry took 1st place among the Hawaii Guard teams in the William Randolph Hearst Musketry Competition and each member was awarded a bronze medal.

Schools—Captains Samuel L. Keala, 298th Infantry, and Frank A. Alameda, 299th Infantry, attended the National Guard Company Officers' Course at The Infantry School, Fort Benning, Georgia, from February 28 to May 28, 1938, graduating with creditable ratings.

Armory schools for officers and men were conducted throughout the year. The classes were under the supervision of qualified, selected officers from the regiments, and Regular Army Instructors.

Test Mobilization—One of the outstanding events of the past year in the training program was the test mobilization which took place at 10:00 A. M. on February 27, 1938. Organization commanders were given twelve hours in which to assemble their units at designated assembly areas, in full field equipment. The per cent attendance, which was commendable, was as follows:

Field Training—Field training was conducted as follows:

State (Terr.) Staff, at the Honolulu Armory, Honolulu, from July 17 to 31, 1937, incl., with 5 officers in attendance. Major Henry L. Best, Inf., IGD, attended the 298th and 299th Infantry camps; 7 days at Schofield Barracks and 8 days at Paukukalo, Maui. Captain Joseph I. deVille, FD, attended camp at Schofield Barracks and Paukukalo, Maui for 20 days each as Camp Quartermaster.

State (Terr.) Detachment, at Fort Armstrong, Honolulu, from July 17 to 31, 1937, incl., with 1 officer and 12 enlisted men in attendance. Ten other members of the State (Terr.) Detachment were detailed to duty as camp supply detachments; five at the 298th Infantry camp and five at the 299th Infantry camp.

298th Infantry, at Schofield Barracks from August 14 to 28, 1937, incl. 41 officers and 534 enlisted men present.

299th Infantry, at Paukukalo, Maui, from October 9 to 23, 1937, incl. Attendance: 51 officers, 1 warrant officer and 729 enlisted men.

3rd SECTION

SUPPLY, FINANCE, CONSTRUCTION AND TRANSPORTATION

Capt. Joseph I. deVille, F.D., HNG, U.S.P.&D.O. and Territorial Quartermaster—Chief of Section

I—GENERAL

The condition of property and property accounts in the Hawaii National Guard has improved in the past year. All outstanding claims of the Federal Government for lost property have been settled.

New Tables of Basic Allowances issued by the National Guard Bureau for all units contained many drastic changes and as a consequence there are at present many surplus items on hand. There is also a shortage of items recently authorized by these new Tables.

A clothing fitting room has been established in the Honolulu Armory. The system of automatic supply for all units has continued to work satisfactorily and relieves company commanders of much burdensome work. Work is progressing on the Emergency Supply bins, but has been halted temporarily due to the new Tables of Basic Allowances. The Salvage and Repair Section has operated satisfactorily, and the one man assigned to this work has more than he can handle.

This section is in need of a stenographer. At present there is no stenographic assistance assigned. If construction planning work is to continue as a function of this section the services of a draftsman are essential.

Chief of Section

Report of Inactive Personnel as of June 30, 1938—The Inactive National Guard consists of:

- 6 Captains
- 3 1st Lieutenants
- 2 2nd Lieutenants
- 7 Enlisted men holding commissions as 2nd Lieutenants in the Infantry branch of the National Guard of the United States
- 263 Enlisted Men (298th Inf.—93; 299th Inf.—170)

Armory Training Year—Administration of the Inactive officers and enlisted men has been performed by this section during the past fiscal year.

Annual Field Training—The annual field training was performed at the National Guard Armory, Honolulu, T. H., from July 17 to 31, 1937, inclusive.

Medical Section—Major F. L. Morong, M. C.,
Chief of Section

Sanitation—The 298th Infantry was encamped at Schofield Barracks, where the sloping terrain and nature of soil are ideal. The water supply was adequate as to quantity and excellent as to quality. The refrigeration of food could have been better at the annual encampment of the 298th Infantry. The 299th Infantry was encamped at Paukukalo, Maui. The terrain was good and the water supply

potable and sufficient for all needs. Refrigeration facilities of the 299th Infantry were satisfactory. The food supply at both camps was satisfactory as to amount and preparation. Sewage and garbage disposal was also satisfactory at both encampments.

Health—298th Infantry Encampment: 578 cases were treated at the camp dispensary, 23 of which were sent to the Station Hospital at Schofield. There were no deaths. 299th Infantry Encampment: 544 men responded to sick call and were treated at the camp dispensary, 24 of whom were confined to quarters for varying periods, 20 put on restricted duty and 23 taken to the hospital. There were no deaths.

Equipment—Adequate and in good condition.

Smallpox and Typhoid Prophylaxis—Complete in both regiments.

Recommendations—That a written report on camp sanitation, casualties, illnesses, hospitalization and deaths be tendered by the senior medical officer attending a camp, and that such report be forwarded by the camp commander to The Adjutant General immediately upon termination of any encampment in which the whole or parts of the National Guard are employed.

Inspector General's Section—Major H. L. Best, Inf.,
Chief of Section

a. Attended the 298th Infantry and 299th Infantry Camps; 7 days at Schofield Barracks and 8 days at Paukukalo, Maui. Inspected the State (Terr.) Detachment Camp at Fort Armstrong. Reports covering these field training periods were made at the close of each camp.

b. Made the semi-annual audit of the various units of the Hawaii National Guard as required by existing regulations.

c. Investigated and reported on all applicants for commissions in the Hawaii National Guard.

d. Made a number of special investigations during the past year, on which detailed reports were rendered.

e. Checked and supervised training schedules of all units of the Hawaii National Guard during the entire training year and found them satisfactory and complete.

Ordnance Section—Major Francis Xavier, Ord. Dept.,
Chief of Section

During the past fiscal year four (4) Telescopes, Observation (French), 3-Power, M/1917, were received and distributed to the Headquarters Companies.

The condition of ordnance property in the hands of the Hawaii National Guard is very satisfactory, as evidenced by the annual inspection report of the Ordnance Department Inspectors.

No ammunition was declared unserviceable while in storage. Ammunition expenditures were normal. There are sufficient quantities of gas, smoke candles and grenades on hand to meet any minor emergencies.

Judge Advocate General's Section—Capt. Earl R. McGhee, J.A.G.D.,
Chief of Section

No intensified training of officers in court-martial procedure has been conducted in the past year. It is recommended that a special

court be appointed for the 298th Infantry, a special court for each of the battalions of the 299th Infantry, and a general court appointed for the entire National Guard, the personnel of these courts to serve for one year, during which time they would receive instruction from the Judge Advocate and Regular Army instructors.

More time should be devoted to instruction of officers and non-commissioned officers on the subjects of rendering aid to civil authorities and the enforcement of martial law.

It is recommended that the Military Laws of the Territory of Hawaii be re-compiled and published in mimeographed form to be included in the binders with Territorial Military Regulations, and that all Territorial Military Regulations cite Territorial or Federal laws and/or regulations upon which such Territorial regulations are based.

5th SECTION—MISCELLANEOUS

Report of Armory Board—Lt. Col. W. R. Dunham, T. H.,
President of the Board

The members of the Armory Board are as follows:

During the fiscal year 1938 a change in the members of the Armory Board was made by The Adjutant General. Lieutenant Colonel Walter R. Dunham relieved Major Allen W. Smith, 299th Infantry, as President, and Captain Nash A. Witten relieved Captain Joseph I. deVille, F.D., Territorial Staff, as member of the board. Besides the regular monthly meetings, the board met and made a thorough inspection of the buildings located in Honolulu. The Armory Board has no funds for major repairs and alterations to buildings. This limits the functions of this board to merely an advisory board on general policies on rentals.

The Honolulu Armory is much too crowded for the entire 298th Infantry. An addition should be made to this building, or the offices now occupied by The Adjutant General and his office staff, the Territorial Staff Officers, and the Hawaiian Department Civilian Component Staff should be vacated for the use of the regiment. Most of the windows and outer doors are now protected with heavy metal screen. There are still a few more windows which need to be screened and the two fire escape doors covered with heavy sheet metal. An inspection by the Territorial termite experts indicates heavy termite infestation, and many of the window and door casings, beams and posts throughout this building need to be replaced. The motor transportation parking area in rear of the Honolulu Armory is most inadequate. Truck sheds should be constructed elsewhere to take care of the present crowded situation.

The Old Armory situated on Beretania Street, in rear of the Honolulu Armory, is at present a fire hazard to the community. This building is of frame construction with corrugated iron roof. In front of the building several parts have fallen which make it dangerous for pedestrians to walk past this building on Beretania Street. The building itself is termite infested. It should be torn down and a new building constructed to meet the crowded situation in the Honolulu Armory.

Iolani Barracks which is being used by the 299th Infantry units stationed in Honolulu is an old, historical building, one of the few such buildings now existing in the Territory of Hawaii. This building should be renovated and preserved. Recently a dungeon was located in this building under the main floor. Many rumors have been heard that a secret passage connecting this building with Iolani Palace was in existence during the Hawaiian Monarchical days. This passage has never been located.

The Hilo Armory is of hollow tile construction. Although this building is in fair condition, much damage has been caused from rain water seeping through the roof and side walls. Captain Nash A. Witten made an inspection and recommended to The Adjutant General that immediate attention be given to the leaky condition of this building. This building needs a new roof, and the side walls should be made waterproof.

The Honomu Armory is of frame construction. It is in good condition.

The Lahaina Armory is of frame construction with concrete basement. This building is in good condition, but needs a new coat of paint.

The new Wailuku Armory, Wailuku, Maui, constructed at a cost of \$102,632.00, was officially opened on December 4, 1937. It houses the following units of the 1st Bn., 299th Infantry: Headquarters and Headquarters Company, Companies B and D. The plan of the building is as follows:

- Basement Floor:** Area 17,456 sq. ft. with 3 locker rooms, 3 supply rooms, 2 storage rooms, 3 strong rooms, 1 magazine room, rifle range and toilets. Height of basement floor to 1st floor ceiling 11'-0. Ample room so that trucks can drive into building. Present basement (under main hall) has no concrete floor.
- First Floor:** Area 17,308 sq. ft. Consists of 2 offices, 1 assembly room, 3 company rooms and main drill hall, 95'-0 x 700'-0, kitchen and rest room.
- Second Floor:** 2 Balconies, one on each side of hall, and office quarters. Total area 2nd floor, including balconies, is 4,609 sq. ft.
- Structure:** Main hall floor of wood, supported by structural steel frames. Main trusses of steel supported by steel columns. All roof of wood sheeting covered with felt roofing. The two wings and the front office portion of concrete skeleton with wood joists and flooring. All outside wall of hollow concrete tile plastered outside.

The construction of the armories on Molokai and Kauai has been delayed. It is hoped that these armories will be constructed before the end of 1938.

The Paia, Hoolehua, Papaikou and Olaa armories are all loaned to the Hawaii National Guard. They are of frame construction.

Target Ranges

Target ranges operated under the control of this department are as follows:

Punchbowl, Island of Oahu—Rifle, 200 and 300 yards, 14 targets. Small bore (.22 Cal.) 25, 50 and 100 yards, 24 targets. Pistol, 20 targets, newly constructed range for slow and rapid fire, 15, 25 and 50 yards.

Kuliouou, Island of Oahu—Rifle, 200 yards, 14 targets.

Lahaina, Island of Maui—Rifle, 200 yards, 3 targets.

Paukukalo, Island of Maui—Rifle, 1 pit, 6 targets, firing line echeloned for 200 and 300 yards. Machine gun 1000-in. small bore and pistol, 14 targets.

Walakea, Island of Hawaii—Rifle, 200, 300, 600 and 1000 yards. Pistol and machine gun, 1000-in. course, 4 targets.

Olaa, Island of Hawaii—This range has been abandoned.

Conclusion

It is earnestly recommended that Your Excellency support a financial program for the Hawaii National Guard so that we may be able to spend the moneys appropriated by the Legislature to the best advantage for the protection of persons and property in the military service of the Territory. It is hoped that a way can be found to avert the conditions arising in the present biennium wherein the Legislature of 1937 evidently intended to provide the necessary funds for the proper and safe upkeep of the buildings and equipment of the Military Department, but when the time arrived to use such funds it was discovered that they have been either placed in the wrong appropriation or were not available where normally to be expected. It is believed it would not cost the Territory any additional money if the above suggestion were placed into effect. The cooperation of Your Excellency is earnestly solicited to the end that the 1939 Session of the Legislature include all moneys for repairs and alterations to armories in the funds appropriated to the Military Department, or in a separate specific item to the funds allotted to the Department of Public Works.

The year 1939 will see quite an expansion in the local Guard as it is fully expected an additional battalion of infantry will be mustered into service either in the latter months of 1938 or the early part of 1939. More funds will be necessary for this increase in the Guard of approximately 10% in personnel and 3 new armories which will need equipment and operating expenses.
