II GENERAL

The primary duty of all instructors is to assist in the maintenance of a sound organization of the Hawaii National Guard and to develop well trained units that will be self sufficient administratively, and combat effective if called into the Federal Service in case of a National emergency. To accomplish this mission, it becomes necessary for all instructors to offer advice, to supervise and actively assist in training, supply and administration of all units of the Guard.

III SENIOR ARMY INSTRUCTOR

He is responsible for liaison between the local Army Commander and the Adjutant General of the Territory. He acts as Military Advisor to the Adjutant General of the Territory. He also supervises and coordinates the official work of all Army Instructors in the Territory.

IV ARMY INSTRUCTORS FOR INFANTRY & FIELD ARTILLERY UNITS

1. The instructors and advisor-instructors further the efficiency of National Guard units through assistance and advice to responsible commanders on such matters as attendance records, pay rolls, Morning Reports, personnel records, supply records and required reports submitted to higher headquarters. They conduct inspections of arms and equipment and administration; review, supervise and advise on all instruction and instructional material and advise Guard commanders in the proper means of preparing and executing training programs so that armory and field training time is profitably utilized through well planned instruction. They aid and advise the Guard instructors and conduct classes in administration and training; assist in developing in the officers and noncommissioned officers qualities of leadership and aid the unit and individual in civic activities and personal problems. They participate in armory drill and other training periods and maintain liaison between National Guard units and Senior Army Instructor.

2. In addition to the Army Instructors for Infantry and Field Artillery, there are in the Instructor Detachment two sections, Administrative and Army Aviation and one Ordnance Technical Advisor.

a. The Administrative Section prepares all official directives of the headquarters, publishes guides to further perfection of NG administration, maintains files, processes correspondence, checks and advises on the preparation of NG strength reports, pay rolls and vouchers. Interprets and clarifies the laws and regulations governing the activities of the National Guard, advises in the best methods to be used in complying. Prepares form control reports, progress estimates reports, group labor reports. Prepares and submits to higher headquarters reports on National Guard activities. Maintains property records and performs personnel administration for the Detachment.

b. The Army Aviation Section advises on matters pertaining to liaison type aircraft furnished National Guard units. Conducts operational training courses for pilots. Conducts technical inspections and advises National Guard Army Aviation Sections in matters of flight training.

c. Ordnance Technical Advisor assists in the operation of the State Maintenance Plan covering receipt, storage and issue of Ordnance supplies and equipment; location of shops, examination of pool mechanics. Advises on maintenance of records and control of supplies. He also acts as Army Instructor of the 613th Ordnance (MM) Company.

PERSONNEL AND ADMINISTRATION AS OF 30 JUNE 1950

I Strength of the Hawaii National Guard from 1 July 1949 to 30 June 1950

On 30 June 1950, the strength of the Hawaii National Guard was 322 officers, 35 warrant officers and 5528 enlisted men, for an aggregate strength of 5885. This represents an increase of 262 since 30 June 1949 and was 77.4% of the total authorized strength. The Hawaii National Guard stood third among 51 states and territories in the percentage of authorized strength recruited on 30 June 1950.

The Chief of the National Guard Bureau in December 1949 imposed strength ceilings on National Guard organizations in order to hold nationwide Guard strength within budgetary limitations. This ceiling forced the reduction of Hawaii National Guard strength from its all-time high of 6125 officers and men in December 1949. The strengths and stations of units and organizations were as follows on 30 June 1950:

The most notable increases by islands were on Hawaii with a gain of 129 and Kauai with 96 since 30 June 1949.

II. Discharges

During the fiscal year there were 1,472 enlisted men discharged from the Hawaii National Guard. A new factor which increased the number of discharges over the previous fiscal year was the advent of discharges upon expiration of the term of service. 507 men who enlisted during and after September 1946 for three years were discharged for this reason. Approximately 66% of those so discharged reenlisted immediately for another three years. Incompatible occupation was ruled out as a reason for discharge during the fiscal year, and all individuals applying for release due to that reason were transferred into the Inactive National Guard. As of 30 June 1950 the Inactive rolls included 17 officers, 1 warrant officer, and 465 enlisted men. Net attritional losses for the fiscal year were 1,473, including transfers to the Inactive rolls and adjusted for reenlistments.

III. Recruiting

Recruiting activities during the fiscal year were localized, and there were no Territory-wide recruiting campaigns. All recruiting was conducted at the unit level supported by visual recruiting aids, publicity, etc., furnished by the Adjutant General and the National Guard Bureau. Considering the overall increase in strength and the net attritional losses, the recruiting effort produced approximately 1,735 new men. This figure is 200 below the previous fiscal year, and the cause of the decline is felt to be the damper placed on recruiting in the more populous areas by the ceiling strength imposed by the National Guard Bureau.

IV Administrative Developments

The administrative activities involved in the management of HNG personnel increased considerably in scope and volume during the fiscal year. These developments were occasioned by such matters as the passage of Public Law 108, 81st Congress, providing death and disability benefits for Guardsmen comparable to those furnished to the regular armed forces, the expansion of Guard responsibilities in coordination with the Selective Service System, the inauguration of new personnel accounting and pay systems, and the increasing requirements of the reserve component retirement system. All of the above matters caused increases in reports, records, etc., necessary to their implementation. The burden of the increased work load was lightened in January 1950 by the action of the National Guard Bureau in authorizing a warrant officer, known as the Unit Administrator, for each company-sized unit. The overall performance of administrative functions again showed improvement over the previous year, as unit and headquarters personnel became more experienced and standardized methods were adopted.

INTELLIGENCE, PUBLIC INFORMATION AND DISASTER PLANNING

Effective 1 April 1950, the Intelligence Officer, State Headquarters, was placed on full-time Territorial duty in addition to his drill status as a federally-recognized National Guard Officer. In addition to his military intelligence duties, he was given the responsibility for Public Information activities of the Hawaii National Guard and charged with providing the necessary liaison and assistance to the Territorial Director of Disaster Relief.

Some of the more important activities pertinent to these functions and prior to 30 June 1950 are as follows:

Intelligence

Close and continuing liaison was effected with the Intelligence authorities, Headquarters United States Army Pacific and with the Honolulu Police Department. Training for intelligence personnel of State Headquarters, Hawaii National Guard was accelerated and intensified. Closer supervision was effected, in coordination with G-3, State Hq., HNG, of intelligence training for subordinate echelons of the Hawaii National Guard.

Public Information

Liaison with the press and commercial radio stations and with the Public Information Section, Hq. United States Army Pacific, was maintained during this period, with the objective of providing maximum publicity for the Hawaii National Guard. Two important publicity campaigns occurred between 1 April 1950 to 30 June 1950. The first was Armed Forces Day which involved poster and window displays in Honolulu stores, news items and pictures in the local press, radio programs, and participation in the Armed Forces Day parade by elements of the 298th RCT and 111th Army Band, HNG. The other was publicity focused on the Summer Field Encampment which consisted of numerous newspaper articles, pictures and radio publicity.

Disaster Relief Coordination

Extremely close coordination was effected with the Territorial Disaster Relief Agency and other organizations participating in Disaster Relief activities.

Considerable assistance was given the Territorial Director of Disaster Relief in the formulation of the first draft of the plan for disaster relief and in numerous conferences and meetings. Disaster relief plans for the Hawaii National Guard and the Reserve Forces, Hawaii National Guard were drawn up by this section and incorporated by the Territorial Disaster Relief Agency into its master plan.

Elements of the Hawaii National Guard participated effectively in the Lanikai-Keolu Hills brush fire 2 October 1949, in conjunction with muni-

cipal and armed forces fire-fighting teams. During the volcanic eruption on the Island of Hawaii 1 June 1950, the 199th Fighter Squadron, Hawaii Air National Guard, and key personnel of the 299th RCT performed valuable aerial reconnaissance and photographic missions over the affected area.

ORGANIZATION AND TRAINING

A. Status of Organization

1. The status of organization of all units of the Hawaii National Guard remained unchanged throughout the year except for the 613th Ordnance (MM) Company which was reorganized under new T/O&E 9-7 dtd 13 Sep 48 with RT 9-7-22 of May 1 49 effective Nov. 1, 49:
2. Hq & Hq Det Hawaii National Guard, 613th Ord (MM) Co and all Honolulu elements of the 298th RCT were moved to Fort Ruger, Oahu, with first unit arriving on February 15, 1950.

B. Armory Training

1. During the period July 1, 1949 to June 9, 1950 army units of the HNG conducted 48 weekly Armory drills. Each drill consisted of a minimum of two hours of scheduled training under the National Guard Training Program. From July 1 to October 31, 1949 training consisted of First year subjects while the balance of the year was devoted to second (intermediate) year subjects except for recruits who continued with basic subjects. The general subjects taught personnel during the first hour covered:
 - (a) Maintenance of clothing and equipment
 - (b) Drills
 - (c) Individual tactics
 - (d) Military courtesy and discipline
 - (e) Interior Guard Duty
 - (f) Domestic disturbance
 - (g) Employment of the armed forces
 - (h) Basic medical training.

When a soldier became proficient in these subjects he was employed as an instructor or assigned advanced training in other subjects. The second hour training was devoted to such subjects as:

- (i) Marksmanship and mechanical training
- (j) Placing guns in action
- (k) Technique and conduct of fire
- (l) Observer Training
- (m) Fire control instruments
- (n) Squad platoon or section drills in combat formation
- (o) Tank gunnery and driving
- (p) Communications
- (q) Mines
- (r) Booby traps
- (s) Demolitions
- (t) Bridges

Specialist and administrative training was conducted for all such personnel in their primary duties.

2. In addition to these drills each unit spent two or more days on the rifle range during January to June for the purpose of qualifying personnel who had not qualified with the Carbine or Rifle during their current enlistment. At the end of the season over 80% of the guard had qualified.
3. A special Staff training program designed for regimental and battalion staff officers and NCO's was introduced in February 1950 but suspended due to lack of funds. The program consist-

ing of 72 hours of classroom work was to be covered in four quarterly week-end assemblies. Nevertheless the following staffs conducted Saturday or Sunday assemblies as indicated without pay:

C. Field Training

- Field Training was held at Schofield Barracks, Oahu from June 10 to June 25, 1950. The highlights of the training under the second year of the National Guard Training Program were Infantry battalion attack problems, village fighting by platoons, the Army's new transition firing course, Rocket Launcher, Rifle and Hand Grenade practice with live ammunition, and the firing of the 90mm tank guns at Navy towed targets off Dillingham Air Field. In the battalion attack problems, the tank company and the 199th Fighter Squadron lent support. The 483rd and 487th FA Bns concentrated on battery and battalion service practice at Schofield Barracks and Makua ranges and Battery and Battalion section training exercises and reconnaissance, organization, and occupation of position over the varied terrain of Schofield, East Range, Makua, and Wheeler Field. The range practice period was devoted to crew-serve weapons and transition firing, with some guardsmen who had not qualified firing their individual weapons for record. The field phase of the training was held at Kahuku where troops bivouaced on the beach at the air strip and used the air field and hills for their company attack, defensive exercises, and the battalion dawn attacks. The entire program was covered completely during the period and to a high degree of efficiency as indicated in the report of the Regular Army Inspection Board. In "PERFORMANCE" the ratings were:

(e) This reflects an increase of more than 100% over FY 49 in spite of the suspension of the school program in May, and is an indication of the excellent support rendered Hawaii by the Federal Government in the education of its Guardsmen at no expense to the Territory.

2. Throughout the year Troop schools were conducted by Battalion and Regimental commanders for junior officers and NCO's in methods of instruction and leadership, while company and battery commanders conducted specialist classes for enlisted personnel.

During the year 55 applications from officers and enlisted men for extension courses were cancelled for various reasons.

E. Active Territorial Duty.

1. Elements of the Hawaii National Guard were called into the service of the Territory of Hawaii once during the year.
2. On October 2, 1949, a brush fire started at 5:30 a.m. on the northwest side of Bellows Field and the flames spread rapidly in the direction of Keolu Hills village, the burned area comprising approximately 1200 acres. The Honolulu Fire Dept. called on the Governor of the Territory for National Guard assistance and at 11:00 a.m., the Adjutant General was directed to call out elements of the Oahu units. By 1:30 p.m., the Adjutant General, several Staff Officers, the Commanding Officer 298th Inf, and officers and enlisted men of Co A, 298th Inf had entered the fire area and assisted materially in extinguishing the conflagration. At 5:30 p.m. the fire was declared extinguished and the troops were withdrawn.

F. Inspection of Training

1. During the year several inspections of units were made by the Adjutant General, the State Staff, the IG USARPAC, and other USARPAC agencies.
 - (a) The Adjutant General's inspections covered:

 - All units on Kauai - during 26 to 27 September

- (c) Field training inspections were conducted by a board of Regular Armory officers in compliance with Department of the Army and National Guard Bureau directives to determine the combat readiness of all HNG units. The Inspection Board observed closely the training of all army HNG units during the entire field encampment period and reported that our units showed a highly satisfactory state of readiness in consideration of present strength ceilings and phase of training.

 - (a) Independence Day. The 299th RCT at Hilo, the 1st Bn 299th Inf at Wailuku, and the 3rd Bn 298th Inf at Lihue marched in colorful 4th of July parades.

- (b) Maui County Fair. The 1st Bn 299th Inf entered a county fair exhibition of National Guard equipment at the Maui County Fair.
- (c) Armistice Day. Elements of the 298th RCT and the 199th Fighter Squadron participated in the American Legion's Memorial Ceremony at Punchbowl. The State Staff aided in the planning and preparations for the ceremony. Other units paraded on their local islands.
- (d) Pearl Harbor Day, 7 December. A small ceremony was held at the Punchbowl cemetery in which the Acting Governor paid tribute to the men who gave their lives at Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941.
- (e) Kauai County Fair, 6-7 May. The 3rd Bn 298th Inf gave a demonstration of a platoon attack, the 199th Ftr Sq flew combat formations, and the 111th Army Band gave a concert during the fair.
- (f) Armed Force Day, May 20. In Honolulu the 298th RCT paraded with the combined services, while other units held open house and paraded in local community ceremonies.
- (g) Memorial Day was observed by Co B, 299th Inf in a parade at Kaunakakai, Molokai while Btry C, 483rd FA Bn and the color guard 298th RCT participated in the VFW ceremony at Punchbowl.

H. Rifle and Pistol Shooting Activities.

1. Rifle and Pistol competition during the year showed an excellent improvement over the previous years.
 - (a) The NRA Indoor Rifle Tournament was fired pursuant to the provisions of Par 15, NGR 44. Co B, 298th Inf's Team won first place. Co H, 298th Inf second. Service Co. 299th Inf was third. Scores were generally low in this tournament but with the addition of new range facilities, higher scores may be expected for next year.
 - (b) The 613th Ord (MM) Co won the National (State) Trophy (Rifle or Carbine) for Calendar year 1949 in qualifying as marksman or better, the most men, with a figure of merit of 73%.
 - (c) Service Co, 298th Inf with a team score of 1697 finished 18th out of a total of 38 teams entered in the Chief, NGB small bore tournament. M/Sgt Ralph Apo won the high individual award for Hawaii Guardsmen and was 6th in the Army area. Sgt Apo was also one of the five guardsmen of the company to receive the Chief, NGB's team medal.
 - (d) The Territorial Law Enforcement pistol tournament brought out 21 guardsmen who competed will all calibers in the individual matches and included winners in the several match classes. HNG teams competed in all team matches with 613th Ord (MM) Co winning the Adjutant General's trophy for unit pistol team, calendar year 1949.
 - (e) In November 1949 an all service match was fired at the Navy Range, Puuloa Point, Oahu. This match was over the M-1 qualification course "C" and 65 guardsmen competed. All guardsmen competing qualified as marksmen or better and were awarded medals according to their standing.

SUPPLY AND MAINTENANCE (FEDERAL)

OFFICE OF UNITED STATES PROPERTY AND DISBURSING OFFICER

I. General: The supply and equipping of the Hawaii National Guard continue to be maintained at a higher level than the National Guard units of other states. Generally speaking this has been the result of the excellent cooperation afforded the Hawaii National Guard by the Commanding General, USARPAC.

Although no permanent type armory construction has as yet been undertaken, additional progress has been made in the provision of more adequate storage facilities for all units of the Hawaii Guard. Contracts were completed for the erection of motor vehicle storage sheds at all localities on the Island of Hawaii. The storage facility for the artillery units at Kealakekua was completed. A contract calling for the construction of a new service center at Lyman Field was awarded and is now under construction. All of these improvements, accomplished at no cost to the Territory have done much to improve the housing of the H.N.G.

The greatest single contribution, however, was made by army in granting the facilities at Fort Ruger for use by National Guard units stationed in Honolulu. This more than anything else solidified the position of the Guard, enabling concentration of units with more adequate facilities than previously enjoyed.

III. Procurement, Storage and Distribution of Federal Supplies, Army and Air Units: The Hawaii National Guard is now 97% equipped. This percentage is an increase of 12% over that reported for last year and is considered excellent in view of the many increases in Tables of Organization and Equipment. The excellent position enjoyed by the Hawaii National Guard is due largely to the excellent cooperation afforded by the Army in Hawaii and the large stocks of surplus items which were readily available.

V. Facilities: Federal funds in the amount of \$58,148.00 were expended during the past year for new construction and expansion of National Guard Facilities in the Territory of Hawaii. The new construction included the erection of three Service Centers, one Boiler Plant, Maintenance Shop and a 52 point Pistol Range at Fort Ruger, T. H., and one Service Center at Lyman Field, Hilo, T. H.

Additional federal funds in the amount of \$166,519.00 were expended during the past year for maintenance and repair of National Guard facilities in the Territory of Hawaii. The repairs included mainly the rehabilitation of facilities at Fort Ruger and the installation of floodlights throughout the Territory of Hawaii.

VI. Maintenance Program:

a. Maintenance is divided into three parts: Unit Maintenance, Field Maintenance, Base Maintenance.

(1) Unit Maintenance is divided into two parts:

(a) The maintenance a driver, user, or wearer performs on the equipment he is using or has in his custody.

(b) Additional maintenance of Army equipment assigned to a unit by the unit caretaker and mechanics.

(2) Field Maintenance is that maintenance requiring special tools, skills, and parts not authorized for Unit Maintenance.

(3) Base Maintenance is the rebuild of unserviceable items including major items. The Hawaii National Guard performs both Unit and Field Maintenance.

b. To perform Unit Maintenance on the equipment of each unit, the National Guard Bureau has authorized one Unit (Mechanic) Caretaker for each company size unit of the Hawaii National Guard, who is a full-time employee.

(2) Mission of Service Centers:

(a) The service center is established to provide tools and equipment from the Tables of Organization and Equipment of the parent unit for use by the various unit mechanics and contact team mechanics to receive, inspect, and repair items of equipment requiring field maintenance.

(b) The service center is a supply point, inspection point, and the service center mechanics will perform maintenance on all classes of equipment, except liaison aircraft, within capabilities of tools and personnel.

(c) Field Maintenance on all classes of equipment will be performed by Combined Field Maintenance Shop personnel.

(d) Base Maintenance will be performed by Regular Army supporting shops, i.e., Ordnance Service Shop, Signal Depot Repair Shops, etc.

(e) Maintenance of liaison aircraft beyond the capabilities of the Airplane and Engine Mechanics will be performed by the next higher echelon of aircraft maintenance through arrangements made by the State Maintenance Officer.

e. Not-Ready-For-Issue-Program.

(1) Because the vehicles received from the Army were in an "as is" condition and not ready for issue, the National Guard Bureau authorized thirty (30) temporary mechanics, welders, and clerks to process this equipment and put it in a ready-for-issue condition. This program has been authorized from time to time on a temporary basis only as funds, parts, and local conditions permit and or require.




