Guard members say aloha to Garden Isle

About 1.000 Hawaii National Guard troops from Oahu, Maui, Molokai and the Big Island will return home this weekend from duty on Kauai, the state Department of Defense said yesterday.

More than 525 soldiers from the Hawaii Army National Guard's 1st and 2nd Battalions, 299th Infantry, have been on Kauai since Sept. 12. They were the first to arrive and will be replaced by 175 soldiers Field Artillery, based on Oahu.

About 515 members from the Hawaii Air National Guard also will be returning after nearly a week in Lihue. They participated in Operation Garden Sweep, a coordinated action to pick up trash and debris for transportation to landfills.

The Air Guard members are from the 154th Composite Group and 201st Combat Communication Group, both based at Hickam Air Force Base.

In other developments:

■ The USS Bristol County, a Navy amphibious landing ship that is in Hawaii for scheduled training, will deliver electrical generators and civilian relief supplies to Nawiliwili Harbor tomorrow.

Since hurricane recovery operations began, Navy ships have transported nearly 2 million pounds of military and civilian relief material to the Garden Isle.
